IN MEMORIAM



John "J.R." Johnson Jr.,Col USAF (Ret) b. 22 Mar 1922; d. 05 Feb 2016 in Granite Bay, CA

John Riley "J.R." Johnson died peacefully on Friday, Feb. 5, 2016, in Granite Bay, Calif., at the age of 93 with his son and daughter in attendance.

John was born March 22, 1922, in Providence, Ky., the fourth of seven children of J.R. Johnson Sr. and Zita Marguerite (Lucas) Johnson.

He graduated from Frankfort High School in 1940 and in 1942 joined the U.S. Army Air Corps as a pilot. During a mission over Holland, he was shot down and held as a prisoner of war in Stalag Luft 1A, Barth, Germany. His memoir about this period, "Un-Armed, Un-Armored and Un-Escorted, A World War II C-47 Airborne Troop Carrier Pilot Remembers," was published in 2014.

After the war, John returned to Frankfort and married his high school sweetheart, Lou Avah Pevlor. He graduated from University of Kentucky with a B.S. in Industrial Chemistry and was subsequently awarded an M.S. in Nuclear Chemistry from Ohio State University and an M.A. in International Relations from George Washington University.

John served in the U.S. Air Force for 30 years with assignments in Yokota, McClellan, Wright Patterson and the Pentagon. He retired from the military in 1973 as Deputy Director for Scientific and Technical Intelligence, Defense Intelligence Agency.

After his distinguished career in military service, he spent another 22 years working in private industry in the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area before finally retiring.

Following the death of Lou Avah in 1993, he moved to Granite Bay, Calif., where he was actively involved with his church and community.

He was preceded in death by Lou Avah Johnson, his son Kenneth Layne Johnson, his second wife Anne Deets Johnson and third wife Lois Johnson.

He is survived by his sister Rosemary Dodds; his three children, Jenefer Lee Johnson, Cindy Lou Johnson and husband Nick, John R. Johnson and wife Claudia; and his two grandchildren, Scarlet Teresa Johnson and Eva Ruby Johnson.

He will be remembered as a pilot and patriot and as an admired father, grandfather, brother, uncle, friend and neighbor, loved by all who knew him.

Services will be held at the First United Methodist Church in Frankfort, Ky., on Saturday, Feb. 27 at 2 p.m. with a burial following at the Frankfort Cemetery.

Retiree personnel service available 24/7



The Total Force Service Center can deliver personnel services to the retiree family via telephone any time and from any location.
To reach a Total Force Service Center agent, call 800-525-0102 and select the menu option for retired military with personnel inquiries.
Note: Expect a long menu of options to select, but you will get some useful information.

Report death to DFAS soon to avoid pay issues

Defense Finance and Accounting Service officials advise reporting a retiree's death as soon as possible by calling 800-321-1080, or completing a Notification of Death Fast Form on the DFAS website. Need help? Call the McClellan Retiree Activities Office: 916-640-8446

This will help avoid delay and possible financial hardship to surviving beneficiaries, family members or executors, who will be required to return any unearned military retirement payments.

Eligibility for military retired pay ends with the death of the retiree. If a retired pay payment was issued for the month in which the retiree died, the bank will be notified to return the payment. The beneficiary of the arrears of pay may be due a prorated amount for the month of death.

The caller reporting the death will need the retiree's name, Social Security number and date of death.

1959 AUSTIN-HEALEY 100-6

WFO Sports Car Racing

From 1958 through 1960, WFO was a hotbed of sports car racing! I know that it sounds strange, but what would you expect from our unique bunch of people? Scuderia McClellan was our name, and the rearing skunk that looked a lot like the rearing horse of the Ferrari was our emblem. It was chosen so that we could feel a kinship with Ferrari. Bobby Jones and I had silver Austin-Healey 100-6's, Don Yarnell had a bug eye Sprite, and another guy had an MG TF. An officer from another unit on base rounded out our team with another Sprite.

A guy in our unit had been involved in sports car racing on the east coast, so we had his guidance to help us do things to the cars to make them more competitive. Nothing was done to the engines of the 100-6's except to tune them really well. The Sprite engines were taken apart, balanced, lightened the push rods and the flywheel, and the headlights were remounted to fit inside the bonnet. Those suckers would rev over 10,000 rpm and accelerate like a scared rabbit topping 100 mph. We initially raced in the parking lot across from the base in timed single car at a time events called Gymchanas... We then graduated to actual racing against other cars on an airport track. The Sprites were the only ones used there since they were way ahead of anyone else in their class. The first race, however, was not quite a success. To shorten the time for any pit stop, we decided to leave the bonnets unlatched after trying it before the race. Well, the race got underway, and after several laps we discovered the error of our ways. The non-WFO car came in and said the he was having the bonnet flip up when he was in traffic. We latched his and sent him back out, and we had a pit board ready telling Don to bring his in. We didn't need to. He arrived at the pit with the bonnet all the way back over so the it hit the boot. We had removed the windshields, so the only thing else that it could hit was Don's helmet! It hit so hard that the seat rails under him were bent down! He was so strong that he only suffered a little discomfort in his neck. We never won that kind of race, but when we included rallying, we hit pay dirt! Pete Thomkins had gotten a Triumph TR-3 to join us. Our club put on a long rally called the Petite Monte Carlo. With Pete driving and me navigating the 100-6, we pulled off first place to top a well-seasoned field. The next big one was in the Clock and Dial Rally. This was a prestigious statewide rally pitting novices and serious teams against an overnight 12-hour course with numerous checkpoints. Hitting the checkpoints with the least variation in elapsed time was needed to win. If you missed any one by a minute, you were in serious trouble. The year before, Don had run this in his Sprite and had actually flipped off the road landing upside down on some substantial brush! With a lot of help, they got it back on the road and finished! We did not want that to happen to us! With a couple of miscues and a lot of luck, Pete and I took first place in his TR-3 in the novice division, and our team of 3 entries took first place in the novice teams! Move aside Enzo Ferrari and Juan Fangio! That was the high point of our racing, but oh what fun and what a memory!




