INTO THE MUSHROOM CLOUD

OPERATION IVY

The shock wave from Ivy Mike was conducted through Earth and picked up back in the U.S. by some seismometers. Edward Teller, co-creator of the bomb was one of the first to know. Back in America it was Halloween, but he had an extra reason to celebrate. Overjoyed, he sent a telegram to his colleagues. For security reasons it said only: "It's a boy." inaugurated the thermonuclear age with the first "true" thermonuclear test (code name Mike), which was considerably more powerful than all the high explosives used in two World Wars put together. Ivy also tested the highest yield pure fission weapon ever exploded.

When the world's first hydrogen weapon, in a test designated "Mike," wiped out the Marshallese island of Elugelab on November 1, 1952, four F-84G fighters carrying sample collection equipment on their wingtips were already in the air. Designated Red Flight and led by Lieutenant Colonel Virgil Meroney, the jets arrived in the area of the bomb cloud about an hour and a half after detonation. Under instructions from the Convair B-36 sampler control aircraft circling some distance away, Meroney and his wingman penetrated the mushroom cloud's stem at about 40,000 feet. (As predicted,

the main cloud, which began forming at about 55,000 feet, was too high for an aircraft to reach. Samples from the stem would have to do.) Immersed in the dull red glow of the cloud interior, Meroney watched all his radiation instruments peg to their maximum readings. After about five minutes inside, he and his wingman executed a 90-degree turn and escaped. Then came the rest of Red Flight: Red 3 with Captain Bob Hagan, and his wingman, Red 4, Captain Jimmy Robinson. Hagan calls the cloud "dark and boiling." Above, the mushroom cloud grew hungrily, pushing up 33km in 2 minutes and eventually spreading out to cover 7,500 square kilometres of sky. What had happened? The four jets would find out. Each was equipped with radioactive sampling boxes on their wing tips, they would scoop up any particles and then they would be sent back to the U.S. for testing. They were going to fly into the mushroom cloud. They arrived 90 minutes after detonation, dwarfed by the colossal stem of cloud 32km across. The umbrella of the mushroom loomed over them, beyond the reach of their engines and fuel. The stem beckoned, and the first 2 jets dove in, specks among the maelstrom. Bathed in nuclear radiation they hit their limits 5 minutes in, and turned 90 degrees to exit the cloud. They both successfully burst into light, and were bathed in the Sun's own thermonuclear glow.

The remaining 2 jets plunged in, and misfortune struck. One jet stalled during a turn and plummeted for 6km down the boiling shaft. The pilot managed to regain control and exit, but couldn't find either the fuel tanker or another craft. Eventually he located the radio beacon for Enewetak and headed for it. The island was in sight but the jet caught fire mid-air and he ran out of fuel. The jet went down over the water, and the pilot couldn't escape, his lead-lined vest made movement too difficult. Later searches couldn't find the sunken plane or the body of its pilot, Captain Jimmy Robinson.

Ivy Mike was a success in many ways. It proved the concepts, if not designs for the world of thermonuclear weaponry. Nuclear power is all around us though, ever-present. Every star in the sky is a thermonuclear powerhouse, giving light, heat, and life to their faithfully orbiting spheres. Nuclear fission provides 90% in the earth's core, keeping the continents moving and volcanoes erupting. Not everything was catching up with nature though, from the ash came new forms.

The 3 surviving jets brought back radioactive particles, when analysed they revealed two surprises. Elements, not found anywhere on Earth, had been created in the fiery heart of Mike. Einsteinium and Fermium, synthetic elements only found as the results of experiments, decaying slowly with time. They were the first synthetic elements ever created, later nuclear tests would reveal more unexplored elements.

Vaporizing an entire island was also quite impressive!

CHAMBERLAIN, Richard Eugene "Dick", LtCol USAF Retired

Of Sacramento, died January 1, 2015, at 90 years of age. He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Virginia; son Richard Jr. and his wife Cheryl, son Shawn, and daughter Rebecca and her husband John; four grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren, sister Evelyn, brother Jack, and many nieces and nephews.

Services were held at 2 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 9th at Mount Vernon Memorial Park. The family requests that, in lieu of flowers, donations may be sent to the American Cancer Society or Cal Farley's Boys Ranch near Amarillo, Texas.

Dick was born in Norfolk, Nebraska, the third child of John Harold Chamberlain and Clara Belle Dobney. With the onset of the Great Depression, his family moved to a farm where he grew up during the dust bowl years.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps in 1942 and graduated from pilot training in Texas in 1945. He was transferred to Williams Field, Arizona, where he met Virginia Bowman who became his bride on November 16, 1945. One month prior to their marriage, he was released from active duty. He served in the Air Force Reserve until he was recalled to active duty in April 1953. Dick had assignments throughout Texas, Mississippi, Kansas and Massachusetts in addition to deployments to Korea, Turkey and Southeast Asia.

LtCol Chamberlain worked with Col Lew Horne in Logistics at the 1155th TechOpsSq back in the 1970's. Dick was a LIFE member of the AFTAC Alumni Association - West Coast Chapter.

He was a command pilot with over 8,000 hours of flying time, which included more than 700 hours of combat flying time. He flew 23 different military aircraft and received numerous awards and decorations, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, and the Air Force Commendation Medal. He retired in 1974 after 31 1/2 years of military service.


EVENTS CALENDAR
